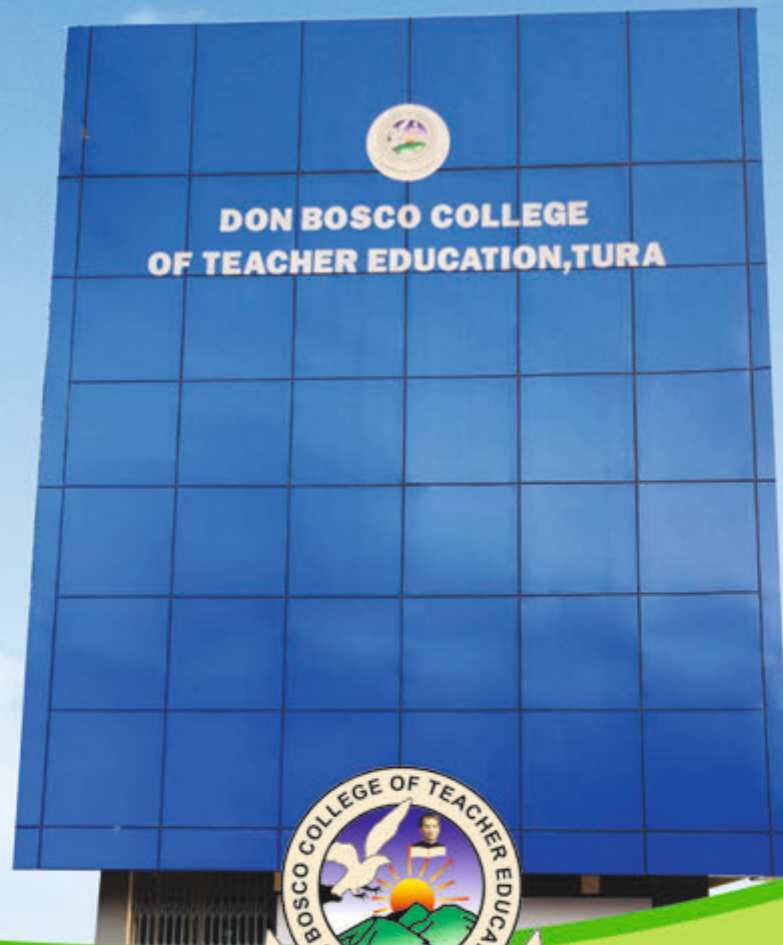

DON BOSCO (1815-1888)

His Vision..... Our Inspiration

Saint John Bosco, popularly known as Don Bosco, was a priest of the Catholic Church, who came to the rescue of the poor, disadvantaged youth of his time with his innovative method of educating them through total immersion in their world, with personal involvement in their lives and aspirations, with a dedication that was total.

To ensure that his dedication to their cause shone through his actions, he lived with and for them. He based his education on the three great principles of Reason, Religion and Loving Kindness, as a caring father, doing everything possible for their welfare. The system of education that he envisioned aims to create generations of young men and women who are intellectually competent, morally upright, socially committed, spiritually inspired and devoted to their country and the world.

Don Bosco, the Founder of the Don Bosco Society, continues to be our inspiration.



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1. DON BOSCO

The college is named after St John Bosco, popularly known as Don Bosco, the founder of the religious and educational order 'Salesians of Don Bosco'. Don Bosco was born in 1815, of a very poor family, near Turin, Italy. By dint of hard work and heroic sacrifices he became a priest in 1841. He dedicated himself to the service of poor youth, offering them food, shelter and education. He opened for them schools, technical schools, hostels and oratories. He founded a society of collaborators and extended his work to all over Europe and eventually to all continents. Don Bosco died on 31 January 1888 and was declared a saint on 1 April 1934.

Don Bosco based his system of education on the three great principles of Reason, Religion and Loving Kindness. He looked after the youth as a caring father and dedicated himself totally to their welfare. He did not visualize education in isolation from the needs of the community. Vocational guidance, training and job placement were integral to his scheme of education.

2. DON BOSCO SOCIETY

Don Bosco Society, also known as 'The Salesians of Don Bosco' is a religious order of the Catholic Church. The society has over 32,000 members (men and women) working in 132 countries. Through a global network of educational and social service organizations which include 15 Universities, 60 Institutes of higher education and thousands of schools and social development centres, it cares for the less privileged and marginalized sections of society. It currently caters to over fifteen million young people the world over. Because of its expertise in the field of education, the Society enjoys consultancy status at the United Nations.

3. DON BOSCO SOCIETY IN INDIA

In India, the Salesians of Don Bosco began their operations way back in 1906. From a small beginning with a trade school and hostel for poor children at Thanjavoor, Tamil Nadu, the Society today has over 5000 members (Fathers, Sisters and Brothers). Its services are offered through 31 colleges, over 100 technical schools, and a large network of high schools and scores of non-formal technical and agricultural training centres, spread across the country, covering the entire spectrum of social development. The society also runs literacy centres, shelters for street children and rehabilitation and relief operations.

4. DON BOSCO COLLEGE OF TEACHER EDUCATION

Don Bosco College of Teacher Education (DBCTE) Tura is a teacher training institution established and managed by the Don Bosco Society in India, Guwahati Province. Don Bosco College of Teacher Education is a Registered Society under the Society Registration Act of 1860 (Reg. No. SR/TDBC-232/91 of 1991). The College has been granted recognition by the National Council of Teacher Education (NCTE). The college, recognized by the Government of Meghalaya, is affiliated to North Eastern Hill University (NEHU), Shillong.

5. VISION AND MISSION

Inspired by the benign and noble teachings of Lord Jesus Christ who declared of himself “I am the Way, the Truth and the Life” (Jn 14:6) and guided by the moral and educational philosophy of St John Bosco, Don Bosco College of Teacher Education (DBCTE) envisions generations of in-service and pre-service teachers qualified and motivated to impart quality education at the secondary and higher secondary levels. Don Bosco’s principles of education - based on Reason, Religion and Kindness - will guide the training programme. There is no better contribution to education than the effective training and motivation of teachers.

6. OBJECTIVES

The Bachelor of Education (B.Ed) Programme of DBCTE aims at developing the understanding and competencies required by teacher-trainees for effective teaching-learning process at the secondary stage. It enables in-service and pre-service teachers to select and organise learning experiences according to the requirements of today’s learners. In addition, it provides knowledge and develops in them an understanding of areas such as student psychology, guidance and counselling, educational evaluation, educational technology, school management, etc.



The programme aims to enable Teacher-Trainees to achieve the following objectives:

- To acquire knowledge and develop an understanding of the various methods and approaches of organising learning experiences of secondary school students.
- To develop skills for selecting and organising learning experiences.
- To understand the nature of the learning process.
- To develop skills in dealing with the academic and personal problems of learners.
- To develop skills involved in selecting, developing and using evaluation tools.
- To acquire knowledge and develop an understanding of various aspects of school management.
- To develop competencies for organising various instructional and student support activities



7. ISSUE OF APPLICATION FORMS AND MODE OF PAYMENT

Application forms for admission to B. Ed are issued from 18th May 2026 during office hours between 10.00 AM to 01.00 PM. The Prospectus and Application forms are available at the college office for Rs 800/- (Eight Hundred). They can also be downloaded from the college website www.dbctetura.com and dispatch, duly filled, to Don Bosco College of Teacher Education Tura. Online availability of form and prospectus is limited to **48 hours only**.

8. ELIGIBILITY

1. Candidates with at least fifty percent (50%) marks either in the Bachelor's Degree or in the Master's Degree are eligible for admission to B.Ed. course in DBCTE.
2. SC/ST candidates of Meghalaya are eligible as per the reservation policy of the State.
3. All candidates must have attempted at least CUET-PG

The last date for receipt of application forms in the college office is 29th May 2026.

11. ADMISSION PROCEDURE

1. Admission is given on the basis of marks obtained in graduation or post graduation and aptitude for teaching.
2. Written Test / Interview will be conducted. Dates of Written Test / Interview will be notified on the college notice board / website.
3. Common University Entrance Test (CUET) is mandatory for new B.Ed. course admissions in North Eastern Hill University (NEHU). Accordingly Don Bosco College of Teacher Education, Tura will give preference to those who cleared CUET (PG) Paper COQP03. We are not giving forms to non-cuet candidates.
4. Preference will be given to CUET students (particularly tribals) from Meghalaya and candidates deputed by the Don Bosco Educational Society.

12. DOCUMENTS TO BE SUBMITTED AFTER ADMISSION

1. Originals of migration certificates (for candidates not from NEHU) are to be submitted within one month of admission.
2. Certificate of fitness issued by a registered medical practitioner. This certificate must indicate the blood group of the candidate and the registration

15. CLASSES

Classes will commence on Tuesday, 4th August 2026. Attendance on the opening day is compulsory. Students should submit their original documents for verification and two passport size color photographs on the first day of class. Attendance on the opening day is compulsory for all semesters and late comers may be asked to pay fine as desired by the college.

16. ATTENDANCE

Every student is required to attend minimum 90% of lectures delivered in each course. Attendance will be taken for each lecture. Any absence should be with prior sanctioned leave. In case of any emergency such as sickness, bereavement, etc., the student or guardian should promptly inform the office of the Principal. Students should also produce a medical certificate in case of absence due to illness.

17. DRESS CODE

Personal appearance is an important aspect of communicating professionalism, particularly for a teacher. A professional appearance helps to develop self-confidence and promote an environment of mutual respect and dignity. Students are to come to college neatly and decently dressed. To achieve these objectives, the following dress code is prescribed for the college:

Men: Men are to wear full length trousers/jeans and full/half sleeved shirts. T-Shirts with collar and without graffiti may also be worn.

Women: Girls are to wear trousers/skirts/jeans and full/half sleeved shirts/blouses. They are allowed to wear any Indian traditional dress that exhibit decency and professionalism. Cultural dresses like dakmanda/jainsem/salwar-kameez are also allowed. They may also wear T-Shirts with collar and without graffiti. Sleeveless, short or see-through tops are not allowed.

18. HOSTEL FACILITIES

Limited hostel facilities are available to male and female candidates. Those who require hostel facilities may contact the respective hostel wardens after their admission process is completed successfully.





19. CODE OF ETHICS AND BEHAVIOURAL GUIDELINES

A code of ethics is a part of any profession. It serves as a guideline for forming attitudes and directing conduct. Don Bosco College of Teacher Education, being an institution imparting professional education, presupposes the existence of an environment of integrity. The faculty, students and administrative staff share the responsibility for maintaining this environment.

We expect this code to help mould every teacher-trainee into persons of integrity whose life is characterized by harmonious living and God-orientation. All the members of the college community are expected to abide by this code in letter and spirit, within and outside the campus. To achieve this objective, this code of ethics has been developed:

1. DBCTE believes in and fosters personal, academic and professional integrity. Among other things, integrity calls for:
 - Being honest in examinations and assignments, avoiding plagiarism and misrepresentation of facts.
 - Not using computers to gain access to unauthorized information or objectionable websites.
 - Not evading legitimate financial obligations.
2. A student of DBCTE cultivates a basic God-orientation that contributes to the development of an integral healthy personality. This requires:
 - Respect for all religions and faiths.
 - Active participation in the morning assembly and prayer, and in the all-faith prayer sessions that may be organized from time to time. However, no external form of worship other than that of the Catholic community is permitted in the college premises.
3. Substance abuse such as use of tobacco, alcohol, drugs, etc., is contrary to the dignity of human beings and as such, they will not be brought into, or used within the campus of DBCTE.
4. While cell phones have become very common, it is necessary that they be used with proper etiquette. Their use during academic activities and official functions violates this etiquette.

5. DBCTE is a Don Bosco Institution. A fundamental characteristic of a Don Bosco institution is the family spirit. This is to be ensured by:
 - Cordiality in relationship between and among students and staff members.
 - Harmonious living and respect for members of other communities and religions.
 - Not taking part in divisive activities and partisan politics or forming associations which go counter to the spirit of harmonious living. While the college fosters associations which have representatives from among the students, staff and management, union activities are not permitted in the college premises.
6. Ragging and eve-teasing are activities which violate the dignity of a person and will not be tolerated. These will be dealt with according to the laws in force.
7. DBCTE values community service as an integral part of education. Whenever the college organizes programmes to achieve this end, students are expected to take part in these whole heartedly.
8. Discipline is an essential aspect of the maturing process. The college shall provide an environment conducive to self- discipline. To maintain this environment:
 - Students shall treat teachers and those in authority with due respect.
 - Acts of indiscipline, insubordination and interference in administration are unacceptable. Education is more than acquiring knowledge. The college organizes programmes aimed at enhancing the skill-sets required for an integrated personality. Active participation in these programmes is mandatory.
10. Care and respect for common facilities and utilities is an essential component of social responsibility. In view of this, any willful damage to college property must be made good by the persons concerned.
11. One's own safety as well as that of others should be a primary concern of every student, especially in the laboratories. While the college makes every effort to provide a safe and secure environment for work and study, the responsibility for individual safety lies with each student. The college cannot be held accountable for accidents due to carelessness or indiscipline; this Code of Ethics lays down norms of behavior for the more important contexts of life in the college. These guidelines, however, are not exhaustive. Any conduct that goes against the letter and spirit of these principles and norms will be considered a violation of this code.
12. The college prefers natural hair colour for students implying that dying and changing hair colour to fancy hair colours and styles are not permitted in the college. It applies to tattoo as well.

21. ABOUT TURA

Tura is a city and a municipality in West Garo Hills District of Meghalaya. Tura is the second largest town in Meghalaya and is located at the foothills of West Garo Hills, right below the Tura Peak. The climate in Tura is moderate throughout the year. It is 220 kilometres from Guwahati, the largest city in North East India. The main languages spoken here are Garo, Hajong, Koch, Bengali, Hindi and English. The city has several colleges and a host of Secondary and Higher Secondary Schools. The capital city of Shillong is 323 kilometres away and can be accessed via buses or shared taxis.

22. HOW TO REACH DBCTE

DBCTE is situated in the contiguous campus of the prestigious Don Bosco College, located on the hill of Sampalgre, near Chandmari, Tura. Take a bus or shared taxi from Guwahati/Shillong to Tura and get down at Chandmari and take an auto to DBCTE (2 kms).
